From Pain to Purpose: A Life Transformed

My name is Putul Marandi, and this is the story of my life—a life filled with both heartache and hope. Today, I am a third-year student at Anowara Nursing Science and Midwifery in Mirzapur, Dinajpur district, Bangladesh. As I reflect on where I am now, it feels like I am living the best chapter of my life, but the road to this point has been anything but easy.

For most people, childhood is a cherished time—a period they wish to relive. For me, however, childhood was a chapter I wanted to escape. My earliest memories are filled with pain. When I was very young, my father walked out on my mother, leaving her alone to raise me, my elder sister Merina, and my brother Shimanto. I was the youngest, and my mother had no choice but to take us to her mother's home, where we lived in a joint family with her brothers. But from the moment we arrived, we were seen as an unwelcome burden.

The weight of being unwanted was something I felt deeply, even as a small child. My mother, faced with no other choice, left us in the village and moved to Dhaka to work and support us. She was forced to make an unimaginable sacrifice—leaving her children behind to fend for themselves. My brother, being the eldest, became our everything. He bathed us, fed us, and even combed our hair. He was only a child himself, but he stepped into the role of a mother and protected us the best he could.

For a while, things seemed bearable. We went to the village school, played with the other children, and swam in the ponds—innocent moments where we could forget the heaviness of life. But as we grew older, the harsh realities set in. We had to work in the fields for food, and I remember one day, a teacher came to the field and pulled me out so I could sit for an exam. Even in those moments, it was clear how different our lives were from the other children.

At my grandmother's house, we were treated as outsiders—reminded constantly that we didn't belong. The villagers gossiped about us, whispering about how my father had left my mother for another woman. The stigma of being a child from a broken family weighed on me. No matter what I did, I couldn't escape the judgment. I was just a child, but it felt like the world had already decided my worth.

I stayed in the village school until class 5. Then, one day, a teacher from SAMS took me under their care and got me admitted as an orphaned child. That was the turning point in my life. At SAMS, I found something I had never known before—belonging. It became my family, where I was no longer the girl with a broken family, no longer the child pitied by the villagers. I was simply one of many children like me—each carrying their own burdens but now with a shared sense of hope.

Soon after, I was blessed with sponsorship, and for the first time in my life, I didn't have to worry about school fees or food. It felt like a miracle. I began to dream—something I had never allowed myself to do before. I dreamt of changing my fate, of finding a future where I could break free from the chains of my past.

But as I found hope, my brother and sister were left behind. My sister, Merina, couldn't continue her education and was married off to a man from the village. She had wanted to study, but our family refused to support her.





Water Tank Distribution at NBAS-CFSD Project, Monosapara

In many rural and remote communities, the lack of proper water storage facilities leads to increased hardship, especially during dry seasons or periods of water scarcity. Recognizing this critical need, the project distributed water tanks to ten selected community beneficiaries to help improve their water storage capacity and overall hygiene practices.

The distribution was graciously led by Mr. Amol Baroi, Union Treasurer of BAUM, along with respected community leaders Pastor H. Hajong and Mr. Sujon Sangma. Their presence and involvement emphasized the importance of community collaboration in addressing local needs. Each water tank provided will enable families to safely collect and store clean water, reducing the time and physical burden of fetching water from distant sources and minimizing the risk of waterborne illnesses.

This initiative reflects BCSS's ongoing commitment through the CFSD project to empower communities with practical resources that enhance health, dignity, and resilience. Project Spotlight: Bangla Help Light School Spreading Light Through Learning

The Bangla Help Light School Project is a compassionate initiative dedicated to providing education and nourishment to underprivileged children living in slum areas. With the vision of ensuring every child's right to learn and grow, the project runs five feeding schools—Bonorupa, Konabari, Kornopara, Pagar, and Keranigonj—supported by generous donors through BCSS. Since its inception in 2000, the project has grown steadily, now serving 960 children annually with quality education and one nutritious meal each day.

BCSS manages the schools, which operate with the help of 41 dedicated staff, including 30 teachers and 10 support members. Each school runs from 7:45 am to 5:00 pm, driven by the belief that every child—regardless of background or faith—deserves a chance to learn and thrive.

Tree Distribution Program at Mohanoil ICDP School

This program was more than just a distribution—it was an educational experience and a call to action. Students learned the value of environmental stewardship, while families committed to planting and caring for the trees as a symbol of their responsibility toward the planet. The involvement of Child Representatives helped spread awareness and motivate younger participants.

"Stitching a New Life: From Brothel to Empowerment"

Under the RCOP project, the TVET Sewing Machine Training program has brought a new chapter of hope and dignity to 30 underprivileged women from the brothel community. Through six months of skill-based training, these women have been empowered to become self-reliant and contribute meaningfully to their families and society. The program was not just about teaching stitching—it was about restoring self-worth, building confidence, and creating pathways out of a life many of these women longed to leave behind.

The farewell and certification ceremony was an emotional and joyous moment. It marked not only the end of their training but also the beginning of a new journey. Six participants have already started earning by using sewing machines at their homes or suitable workplaces, and several others are planning to move away from the brothel in search of better opportunities. BCSS also hosted a pre-Christmas celebration as part of the year-end program, making the occasion even more special. For many, it was the first time they felt truly valued. The performances by the participants and the distribution of Christmas gifts added warmth and celebration to the memorable event.

Among the inspiring stories is that of Santona Akter, a 30-year-old woman and a student of the program's third batch. After spending seven years in the brothel, Santona longed for a life of dignity and freedom, especially for the sake of her young daughter. When she found the TVET program, it changed everything. With training and support, she left the brothel, moved into her own home three kilometers away, and started sewing work using an old machine. Today, she earns around 200 taka per day and is independently supporting herself and her child. Her greatest dream now is to educate her daughter and ensure she grows up with respect and dignity.

BCSS is deeply grateful to all who have supported this life-changing initiative. The impact of the program is already visible in the lives of these brave women, who are now writing their own stories of resilience and renewal.
